The House Committee on Foreign Affairs (the Committee) is investigating the Biden Administration's August 2021 withdrawal from Afghanistan. The Committee requests that the following witnesses, who are important to its investigation, appear for transcribed interviews:

1. Jonathan Mennuti, former Acting Chief of Staff to Acting Under Secretary of State for Management Carol Perez;
2. Mark Evans, former Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary for Afghanistan;
3. James P. DeHart, former lead, Afghanistan Task Force; and
4. Jayne Howell, Bureau of Consular Affairs.

To arrange these transcribed interviews, please have your staff contact the Committee's majority staff at (202) 225-8467 no later than May 22, 2023.

Congress' oversight powers are derived from the U.S. Constitution and have been repeatedly affirmed by the United State Supreme Court.¹ Under House Rule X, the Committee has

legislative and oversight jurisdiction over “[r]elations of the United States with foreign nations generally,” “[d]iplomatic service,” and “[p]rotection of American citizens abroad and expatriation.”² Furthermore, 22 U.S.C. § 2680 states, “The Department of State shall keep the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives fully and currently informed with respect to all activities and responsibilities within the jurisdiction of these committees. Any Federal department, agency, or independent establishment shall furnish any information requested by either such committee relating to any such activity or responsibility.”³
