## A BILL

To require the Secretary of State to develop and maintain an international diplomatic and assistance strategy to stop the flow of illicit opioids, including fentanyl, into the United States, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Save American Fami-
- 5 lies Everywhere from Illicit Foreign Opioids Act" or
- 6 "SAFE from Illicit Foreign Opioids Act".

## 1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2	exclusively from overseas, stopping these drug flows
3	requires enhanced foreign policy engagement by the

5	SEC. 3. INTERNATIONAL STRATEGY TO STOP ILLICIT
6	OPIOID FLOWS.
7	(a) In General.—The Secretary of State, in con-
8	junction with the heads of other Federal agencies, as ap-
9	propriate, shall develop and maintain an international dip-
10	lomatic and assistance strategy to stop the flow of illicit
11	opioids into the United States.
12	(b) Elements.—The strategy required under sub-
13	section (a) shall include, at a minimum, the following:
14	(1) A clear statement of the goals and objec-
15	tives of the strategy.
16	(2) A description of the activities and tools nec-
17	essary to implement the strategy.
18	(3) An identification of concrete benchmarks to
19	judge progress in implementing the strategy.
20	(4) A description of the programs and activities
21	currently underway in support of the strategy.
22	(5) Information on efforts and activities funded
23	or implemented in foreign countries by other Federal
24	agencies relevant to the strategy.

1	(c) Priorities.—The strategy required under sub-
2	section (a), and the activities and assistance used to imple-
3	ment the strategy, should, at a minimum, prioritize the
4	following:
5	(1) Reducing the illicit production of opioids,
6	including by better enforcement of controls to deny
7	producers of illicit synthetic drugs access to pre-
8	cursor chemicals.
9	(2) Strengthening the capacity of partner coun-
10	tries to detect, interdict, and share information on
11	opioid threats.
12	(3) Increasing the ability and political will of
13	foreign countries to target online opioid sales, associ-
14	ated financial flows, and the use of postal systems
15	and shipping services to transport illicit opioids, in-
16	cluding fentanyl.
17	(4) Improving the international legal framework
18	for drug control to better keep pace with rapidly
19	evolving synthetic drug threats.
20	(5) Developing and enhancing partnerships with
21	governments, industry, and international organiza-
22	tions to combat current and emerging opioid threats.
23	(6) Supporting international efforts to decrease
24	global demand for illicit opioids.

1	(d) REPORT AND UPDATE ON STRATEGY.—Not later
2	than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act
3	and annually thereafter for seven years, the Secretary of
4	State shall submit to the appropriate congressional com-
5	mittees a report consisting of the following:
6	(1) The strategy required under subsection (a).
7	(2) Beginning with the second report required
8	under this subsection, a list and description of the
9	following:
10	(A) Benchmarks achieved since the imme-
11	diately preceding report.
12	(B) Any United States programs or activi-
13	ties in support of the strategy initiated since
14	the immediately preceding report.
15	(C) A list and description of concrete ac-
16	tions and commitments by foreign countries
17	and multilateral institutions since the imme-
18	diately preceding report relevant to the strat-
19	egy.
20	SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR ACTIVI-
21	TIES TO STOP ILLICIT OPIOID FLOWS.
22	There are authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-
23	retary of State for each of fiscal years 2020 and 2021—
24	(1) not less than $$12,500,000$ for centrally
25	funded drug supply reduction activities by the Bu-

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1	reau of International Narcotics and Law Enforce-
2	ment Affairs of the Department of State; and
3	(2) not less than $$12,500,000$ for centrally
4	funded demand reduction activities by the Bureau.
